The Certification program. This program is not used by members. The clock tests will remain as they are for a while because there are so many clock "operating systems." The watchmaker's test, with the same "operating system", may have to

be taken at a central location.

Education Committee. Although not doing as well as he would like, Jack wants to teach subjects related to the certification program.

Horological Times. Jack feels there is difficulty in getting writers and there are no policies on how articles are accepted.

Laurie Penman is a world renown Clockmaker. A trained Mechanical Engineer who served in the Royal Air Force, he started clockmaking after a series of machine and mechanical engineering jobs. The author of many fine clockmaking references, he now resides in the U.S. and is the clock instructor for the AWI. He also currently writes a column for *Clocks* magazine.

Laurie spent an entire morning at the HAV National Convention refining the audience's clockmaking skills and answering many questions from the attendees. Included in the subjects

were details of making a clock rack and snail, fixing bent wheel teeth, making a clock cock, fixing cracked wheels, replacing teeth (his method versus the traditional dovetail method), cutting posts, matching a new wheel to old movements, and a lengthy discourse on recoil escapements. For all, the time was well spent and seemed to pass too quickly. His clockmaking knowledge is vast and the audience tapped as much as they could before the next speaker.

HAV thanks Laurie and his wife for sharing his time us, not only at the formal class but during the casual gatherings.

Feature of this issue – Gettysburg

Gettysburg Pennsylvania is the seat of the Adams County government and is the location of a famous courthouse. Seventy-seven thousand residents currently live in Adams County, 8,000 in the city alone. One hundred and forty years ago this July, Adams County was the scene of the turning point in favor of the Union in the War Between The States. Up to that point, the South's Confederacy won most of the decisive battles against the Northern Army and seemed unde-

featable. The three day battle, July 1,2, and 3rd 1863, centered in Gettysburg and almost all buildings instantly turned into makeshift hospitals for the almost 55,000 casualties from those three days.

The Adams County Courthouse, with its clock tower pictured to the right, was one such hospital. Local accounts described sights and sounds too horrible to describe. Today, Gettysburg is a peaceful "tourist attraction" with ample reminders of the carnage in 1863.



Stan's Komputer Korner

My free web site host went away. I was kind of disappointed to find out that my site was no longer working. I am not sure how long it was not there. I shopped around and found a new host. The new host required that I pay for my domain registration through them. This cost \$30 a year, but comes with 50 megs of space and all kinds of tools. These tools allow you to run an Internet business from your site. It also comes with 5 email addresses. I have one set up in the form of xxxx@stanpalen.com. This one my family uses and so far has had no spam.

My cost per year before this was \$15 for the domain registration. This makes my hosting cost \$15 a year. The host I am using is IT3. They have several hosting plans depending on your needs. The available tool icons on their web page after you register fill up a whole screen. This site does not use pop up ads. At my old site, it usually required several tries to get it to come up. The new one comes up right away.

Spam is getting much worse. My regular email account gets tremendous amounts of it every day. I tried creating my own filters, but they never work very long. I tried using McAfee spamkiller, but I did not like it. Spamkiller looks at your email and it separates the mail into ones you probably don't want and ones you probably do. You can then look at titles and delete the ones you want to get rid of. It does not load the whole email, so it is fairly quick.



If you are having good results from an antispam program, please let me know.

If you set up a wireless network in your home or business, please be very careful about security. You need to make sure that all the users are either deleted or have their password changed. There are a number of web sites that publish the master or administrator or manufacturers passwords for various systems. Some systems come with some security turned on and others do not. You need to make sure there are no unauthorized ways into your system. You need to read the security sections very carefully.

There is a great article in June's Computer Shopper about selecting a new printer. Several of the major points the article makes is that you need to consider the cost of the printer cartridges. A cheap printer may have very expensive consumables. It also mentions that you should do test prints of the various printers you are looking at. A companion piece is about reusing cartridges. Sometimes this will change the color balance, and can sometimes damage your printer.

Speaking of color balance, does your monitor show the same color that your printer prints? It is rare that it is exact. It is adjustable on both ends. The other variable is your camera. If you take many pictures and do your own printing, you need to take the time to adjust the color balance of your system. If you spent a lot of time getting a picture just right on the screen with a photo editing program and then it prints differently, you need to do it over again. You can learn to bias your editing so the print comes out right, but since you cannot view the results, it is trial and error. You also may not remember the exact changes the next time you need to print a picture.

NEW YORK AUTHORITIES ARREST BUFFALO SPAMMER Authorities in New York have arrested Howard Carmack, the so-called "Buffalo Spammer," on charges of identity theft in connection to a spam ring Carmack operated. Last week EarthLink won a \$16 million judgment against Carmack as well as an injunction preventing him from sending further spam. Carmack is accused of stealing identities and setting up nearly 350 EarthLink accounts, from which he sent or helped other send hundreds of millions of unsolicited messages. New York Attorney General Eliot Spitzer said Carmack is the first to be prosecuted under the state's recently enacted identity-theft law. Dave Baker of EarthLink said, "Carmack's arrest demonstrates that spamming has both civil and criminal consequences." Internet News, 14 May 2003

SEC FILES FRAUD CHARGES The Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) filed a lawsuit against K. C. Smith in a U.S. District Court in Tennessee. Mr. Smith, a 20-year-old Kentucky resident, was charged with raising \$102,554 through two fake Web sites and millions of spam e-mail messages between May 2002 and February 2003. SEC regulators allege that Mr. Smith's Web site for a fake company, Kryer Financial, offered double-digit monthly returns. Mr. Smith also invented the United States Deposit Insurance Corporation to insure Kryer Financial investments against loss, with a Web site that featured the SEC's official seal. Mr. Smith allegedly used the money he collected for living expenses and neither invested nor insured it. Mr. Smith agreed to a settlement that requires him to return \$107,510 of gains and interest. OWNER OF WEB SITES ACCUSED OF EXPLOITING DO-NOT-CALL LIST The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) this week filed a complaint against Ken Chase, the operator of two Web sites that federal officials say misled consumers about the upcoming federal do-not-call list. The two sites, www.free-do-not-call-list.org and

www.national-do-not-call-list.us, reportedly offered consumers free registration on the federal do-not-call list as well as services to remove consumers from many marketing lists. When the FTC's list goes into effect later this year, however, the agency will not accept registrations from third parties. The FTC expressed concern that the registration services Chase offered were misleading and were used as a "pretext for gathering personal information about people." Chase said he had no intention of misleading anyone but wanted to help consumers fight back against telemarketers. Chase said, "It seems we've blundered, but it was only an attempt to help the public." San Jose Mercury News, 9 May 2003

FEDS CONTINUE TO FIGHT SPAM AND WEB SCAMS Federal officials continue their crackdown on spammers and Web frauds, announcing this week another 45 criminal and civil actions carried out by the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) in coordination with various other state and federal groups. The recent actions cover incidents ranging from online auction fraud to the illegal sale of controlled substances. The FTC has also moved against online scams dealing with SARS, the national do-not-call registry, and someone selling cell phone radiation protection patches. The FTC began an effort to persuade organizations in 59 countries to close so-called open relays, which allow spammers to send e-mail through servers they do not maintain. Such routing of e-mail makes it difficult to identify the source of much spam, and those supporting the move to close the relays believe it would have a significant impact on the amount of spam.
