## Ralph Smith wins 2004 President's award !

Ralph Smith was honored with a surprise presentation of the HAV 2004 President's Award. He was nominated by John Enloe whose nomination sheet with Ralph's numerous horological contributions is extracted here.

Ralph Smith has been an active and involved member of the American Watchmakers and Clockmakers Institute (AWCI), the Horological Association of Virginia (HAV) and the George McNeil Potomac Guild for many years. Ralph is an accomplished clockmaker and has given freely of his time to further the knowledge and expertise of his fellow horologist, both at the state and local levels. Ralph planned and organized the HAV fall seminars in 1999, 2000, and 2003 – all outstanding events that were well attended and greatly appreciated by the membership. He is presently serving as a Director on the HAV Board, a position he has held for several years, where he actively represents the George McNeil Potomac Guild.

Ralph is an avid horologist, engaged in teaching and providing hands-on clock repair. He is also very involved in sharing his knowledge and experience in clock repair. After Mr. Marvin Whitney died, Ralph was one of the students who stepped in and taught the clock repair course for Fairfax County Adult and Community Education, a part of Fairfax County Public

Schools. This course was started by Marvin Whitney and continues to be one of the most popular courses offered by the Adult Education Program. Ralph not only demonstrated a high standard of clock repair in his work, but he taught all the students to take pride in their work and perform to his high standard.

Ralph is also a member of the National Association of Watch and Clock Collectors (NAWCC) and is active in all Guild activities. Besides planning and organizing the HAV seminars, he is a regular attendee and strongly supports all the HAV Conventions as well as its Board meetings. In addition to his horological activities, Ralph is very involved in the Masonic lodge where he leads many outstanding community events. He does all this while running a successful clock repair business. In short, if you need something done, Ralph is the guy to go to!

World Renown Clockmaker, Laurie Penman, at the 2004 HAV Annual Convention in Lynchburg

For the second year in a row, Laurie Penman, a world renowned Clockmaker, honored HAV with his presence at its annual convention. A trained Mechanical Engineer who served in the Royal Air Force, he started clockmaking after a series of machine and mechanical engineering jobs. The author of many fine clockmaking references, he now resides in the U.S. and is the clock instructor for the AWCI. He also currently writes a column for *Clocks* magazine.

Laurie spent an entire morning examining clock escapements. Hints, design secrets, and repair and adjustment techniques were explained in detail. An excellent handout was distributed to aid all

in classroom and at-home work.

Laurie's afternoon session topics included discussion on barrels, short-cuts hints for the workshop, questions and answers from the audience on specific topics or problems, clock mainsprings, wooden movements' bushings, and balance wheel pivot screws.

For all, the time was well spent and seemed to pass too quickly. His clockmaking knowledge is vast and the audience tapped as much as they could before the next speaker.

HAV thanks Laurie and his wife for sharing his time us, not only at the formal class but during the casual gatherings.

## History of the Wreck of the Old 97

At the HAV Annual Convention, noted author and historian, Captain G. Howard Gregory, gave a outstanding presentation of one of his favorite topics and books, *The History of the Wreck of the Old 97*.

On September 27, 1903, the railroad wreck that inspired the popular ballad "The Wreck of the Old 97" occurred in southern VA, near Danville. The southbound mail express train on the southern railroad left the tracks on the trestle and plunged into a ravine. Eleven

persons were killed and seven were injured. This is considered to be one of Virginia's worst train wrecks.

Captain Gregory, a native of Lynchburg, is currently a Captain and Field Division Commander in the Virginia State Police. He served as an extra agent telegrapher for the Southern Railway from 1962-1965.

Although this presentation was primarily targeted for the HAV spouses, it was enjoyed by all. Many thanks to him for this wonderful and interesting history lesson.



## Stan's Komputer Korner

In my last column I was discussing my problems with the video card in my new Dell computer. The problem has not gotten any better, but I have not had a chance to dig into it deeper. It is on my do list.

For those of you that have been putting off getting firewall protection and virus protection, you have run out of time. There are a bunch of new viruses that can infect your machine just by being connected to the Internet for a few minutes without protection. The firewall in windows XP is turned off by default. You must turn it on. There is a major upgrade coming out for XP that will change the default. There is also a new virus that infects servers that host web sites that you might visit that will try to infect your machine when you look at unprotected web sites. You cannot tell from your end which ones are which and a few big name web sites have had problems.

The first step is to make sure you have the latest security updates. There are numerous security updates for whatever version of windows you are using. They should be installed. A few of them have caused problems with some folks programs that need their own updates to work. The way I handle this it to look at the windows discussion groups for a week or so after an upgrade comes out to see if there are problems before I install the upgrade. I have Windows set up to notify me when updates are available.

The second step is to install a virus program. There are some free ones. I use McAfee and some folks use Norton. They should be set to automatically check for updates every time you connect.

The third step is to install a firewall. A free one is Zone Alarm. I use McAfee's firewall. I also have BlackIce on another machine. Again these need to be set to automatically check for and install upgrades.

I recently installed the privacy service from McAfee. I was amazed at the number of problems it found and the number of cookies that try to get installed on my machine. There are cookies that attempt to install from reading my email (this was a new one to me). The privacy service tells me who is trying to install a cookie and gives me the choice of accepting it or not. Most cookies are not a problem. Some need to be accepted for a site to work with you. Online buying often requires them. Ad Aware program blockers and spy program killers are relatively necessary programs if you are going to be on line these days. Most of these are free so far.

The above protections will cost between \$50 and \$100 and come with a year's updates. It will cost about the same to renew your protection for another year. Online there are usually introductory offers.

Would you like to get off the Microsoft band wagon? There is a free operating system at [www.debian.com](http://www.debian.com). The operating system uses Linux as it's base. There are 8710 different packages or programs that you can download or get on a disk for a few dollars. A large group of folks are working to expand the selections and their capabilities. Available programs include word processors, spreadsheets, web browsers, and email programs. One of our HAV members uses this system. If you do experiment with it, you should set your system up as a dual boot so you can start your computer in either one until you are comfortable with the new system.
