Ken will be demonstrating procedures used on American style time and strike movements. Drew will cover several topics including Horological videography, and procedures for re-bushing Swiss automatic wristwatches.

Directions: Ivy Creek Foundation is about 5 miles north of Charlottesville via Route 29.


From North: Turn right on Rio Road.

Watch Program - Drew Zimmerman

Drew Zimmerman is a 3rd generation watchmaker. Drew and his wife Emily own a small watch repair facility in York, Pennsylvania. He graduated from the NAWCC School of Horology in 2007 and then earned his CW21, WOSTEP Certificate and SAW-TA Certificate from the Lititz Watch Technicum in 2010. Drew specializes in modern high-grade Swiss watches, and is also capable of vintage restorations and complication. Drew served several years on AWCI's board of directors - 2 years as Vice-President. Drew's interest in videography has grown from just "an interest" to a side profession -- filming horological related videos. Drew volunteers his time to teach the NAWCC's Introduction to Pocket Watches Class. Topics Drew plans to discuss include: a) horological videography/photography; b) using social media; and c) specialized repairs such as: adding bushings using a centering scope and a lathe, and removing broken/stuck screws in watches.



Clock Program - Ken DeLucca

Ken De Lucca has taught technical, laboratory based courses for over 32 years. A 16-year member of the NAWCC, he is also a graduate of the School of Horology (2007). Ken spent the academic year of 2015-2016 at West Dean College (England), in the Clock Conservation Program. He is employed part-time at Zimmerman Jewelers (York, PA). His modest business in clocks is called The Clockmender.



Ken will provide an introduction to the American style, time and strike movement. In this practical demonstration, the movement will be disassembled and completely inspected. Adjustments will be made to restore pendulum action, strike action, strike point, and overall proper operation. While most clockmakers are familiar with this type of clock movement, general question, personal bench experience and technical discussion will be encouraged during the seminar.

Lloyd Lehn Talked About Cuckoo Clocks At the Potomac Guild's October Meeting

The October Potomac Guild meeting was held on the evening of 3 Oct at the Fairfax City Senior Center. David Staib, guild president, chaired the business meeting which began after the usual meal of pizza and soft drinks.

Lloyd Lehn was the evening's speaker. Lloyd, an AWCI Certified Clockmaker, has specialized in cuckoo clocks since his retirement in 2003. He claims the new challenges on many clocks makes the business interesting.

Lloyd believes the highest risk of any cuckoo clock repair job is with the music box. His presentation featured excerpts from the DVD he sells on music box repair. However he started with a quick overview of the 7x7 foot closet shop and a number of unique fixtures he uses to hold cuckoos.




He then moved with a Music Box 101 orientation and then expanded the discussion to more complex aspects of music boxes.

One section focused on the music box governors which are often challenging. Another focused on the various locking/unlocking lever arms which control the




start and stop of the music box. He also described a number of various types of dancers which come with a clock with a music box.



Lloyd pointed out

that the success of his repair work is highly dependent on the use of a MicroSet timing device.



In the finale, he included a grab bag of other challenges he's faced with cuckoo clocks and unusual cuckoos he has worked on.

STAN PALEN'S Komputer Korner

This column includes hints, helps, suggestions and news for IBM compatible computers.

Many folks are concerned about using free WiFi to connect to the Internet. Your information is not encrypted, so with a few simple tools, other folks can see what you are doing. This means they can grab your passwords. One fairly easy way to fix this is to use a Virtual Private Network (VPN). There are a lot of companies that offer it now. ExpressVPN has the highest rating, but it runs \$10 a month. I have Ivacy. I got a pretty good price for it for a year.

The procedure is to start your VPN and then use your browser or email program. When you start it, it makes an encrypted 2 way communication to their servers, then you use the Internet. You need a fairly good signal for it to work. Your Internet use is hidden. Your browser history on your machine is probably not hidden.

Some folks have been



getting emails that look like they are coming from the Virginia State Police stating that you have a ticket that must be paid. This is a scam – do not reply.

I have been using Ccleaner for quite a while. It was recently purchased by Avast. The first issue by them was contaminated with malware. The version with the problem is 5.33. Go to Filehippo.com to download a later version. You can open Ccleaner and click on update. I prefer not to do this because there are 3 things you can click on and only one is the one without ads and lots of other extras. Hover your mouse over the buttons and look at where it is actually taking you. Adclick is not a good one.

Did you know you can send texts from your computer? The format is phone number no spaces or dashes and vtext.com. 5401118888@vtext.com This one is Verizon. My phone plan charges me 20 cents for each incoming or outgoing text. I am already paying an

enormous amount for one smartphone, a flip phone and a home landline. I prefer not to pay them more, so I discourage folks from texting me. The reply will look like 5401118888@vzwpix.com. This means I might be able to avoid text charges using email from my phone. Other Internet providers may use a different form. There is a limit of characters of probably 144.

One of our members has put together a very detailed document on protecting your computer from almost everything. This includes hacking, virus protection, malware and much more. It is 120 pages in PDF format. I gives a very detailed graphic description of how to install several programs. It also tells you how to get the most out of the free versions. The free versions must be updated and run manually. It would be expensive to install all the paid versions, but they run automatically (updates and scans). Please send me an email at spalen@crosslink.net to request it. Preferred title would be PC Maintenance PDF.

If you are running Microsoft 365 on an Apple device,

be aware that the upgrade to the latest IOS, is not compatible. It is a known problem and they are working on it.

There is a significant improvement coming out in October for Windows Defender. Things folks have been asking for and security updates. Among these are Windows Defender, Application Guard and Antivirus. These probably should not be your only protection. You should make sure that your current virus does not conflict with the new upgrades. One way to slow down your computer is to have your virus programs fighting with each other. Microsoft Edge – the Windows Explorer replacement in Windows 10 is also getting upgrades. Because of these and many other Windows 10 upgrades, it is time to think about upgrading from Windows 7 to Windows 10.

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
