

Then, they took the time to prepare a presentation for the Potomac Guild's June meeting where they shared a bit of what they'd learned.

Many of us had no idea of he complexity and details of becoming a certified clock appraiser. It turns out that the NAWCC class is but one step in fulfilling the requirements of the organizations who specify the requirements for appraiser certification. Appraisals differ for: sales, insurance and other categories. The key to an accurate appraisal which you can stand by in court if necessary is RESEARCH. Research you can back up with written documents. Yet an appraisers needs to learn creative writing to protect themselves in case they are sued.

The both agreed that the key to a successful solid appraisal is: research, research, research.

Thanks to Joe and Jason, Guild members enjoyed another excellent program.

Tommy Wong's Killer Gets Life

She had no idea what tools Joe had nor what they were used for. What is even worse, she had no idea of their value. She had stayed out of Joe's clock cave.

I was looking around at the attendees of May's HAV Convention. Our members are getting older. I saw a lot of white hair from the back of the room - what hair that was left.

I am guessing there will be a number of wives who are going to be facing the same problem in the next several years.

A few days after arriving back home, Clocksmiths had an email from Ronnie Bowen addressing this question. Here is the substance of Ronnie's email.

Why trust someone else with all this stuff?

Take a video camera and start walking around the shop pointing out and describing everything in the shop that would need to be sold and how much it should bring on the open market along with your original price.

This will take a little forethought before you start filming. Do your homework. Make notes and a plan of attack. Then start your film session.

Your product should give your wife something that could be relied on when she goes to sell it.

As far as your customers property goes, you should already have them identified and labeled for 'anyone' to disburse it to the owners!

Let their owners do what they want with their own stuff from that point.

Neither you nor your wife should be concerned where they take the clocks once they leave your shop!

Your video should be very detailed. Your descriptions and value of objects should be as detailed as you can make it. Put prices on tools and parts and things like used movements. iunk movehand tools. ments. electronics, even the furniture and benches.

Go to every clock that you own outright and put a price on it that you could realistically expect on getting for them after you're gone.

If your video is done well, you won't have to worry about anyone taking advantage of your wife. The video will give her a good idea of what she should expect to get for your clock/tool estate.

Make a plan, set a deadline, start collecting data, and start filming.

LOCK YOUR DOORS!

Locking your doors is still the best bet against burglaries.

That was the view of the speaker at the Potomac Guild's

May meeting.

A Crime Prevention
Specialist, from the
Prince William County Police Department,
John Nagle, focused
on securing your home
and your shop. His
talk was serious but at
times amusing as he
described some of the
dumb thing victims and
criminals do.

Most of the following is from a handout Officer Nagle distributed. It was prepared by the National Crime Prevention Council.

Installing locks is the first line of defense. Only half of Americans have dead-bolt locks on all their entry doors. Nearly one of five have none at all. Update your old locks on all doors and windows and replace them with ones which can't be duplicated without your knowledge/

permission.

Other steps can be taken to increase your security.

- Use your locks - they won't

help if not used.

- Do some yard work trim hedges and bushes to bottom of window level.
- Know your neighbors look out for each other.
- Secure you spare key – leave with a trusted friend – never hide it on the property – burglars have

more experience looking for keys than you do hiding them.

- Let there be light make sure all entrances are well lit so burglars can't hide.
- Stop mail and paper deliveries so they don't pile up leaving a message you're gone.

STAN PALEN'S Komputer Korner

This column includes hints, helps, suggestions and news for IBM compatible computers.

Windows 8 A lot of folks have not been happy with Windows 8. They miss their usual start button and the different way some other things work. Microsoft has been listening I guess. There is a new version coming out version 8.1. It is available now in beta versions and is named Blue. It is scheduled to be available October 2013. It will have a start button and a number of improvements. It has a new version of Explorer (the one that does the file search). It is renamed more aptly - File Explorer. Internet Explorer is upgraded to version 11. It appears to be a fairly significant upgrade all around.

Crapware/Junkware Do you have a new machine or are you contemplating buying one. Beware of crapware or junkware that may be installed. Often some of these are only 30 day versions and then they want money. It is strongly recommended that you get rid of it (them) before you start using the computer. Typically they will be in the startup programs slowing everything down. This may also happen to be in software that you download or buy. Sometimes when I install new software, it will ask if I want to add a new toolbar or more. If I am lucky, it will give me the option of unchecking a box or else I have to go through the pain of removing the extra junk.

There are two programs that do



a pretty good job of removing crapware. Slim-Computer and Zsoft-Uninstaller are available from download. cnet.com. Put the name of the program in the cnet search box. The write-

up for SlimComputer gives the best explanation. I have installed Slim-Computer.

A friend of mine asked me to get a computer, get rid of the extra junk, and get it set up for him on his home network. For the funds he was willing to spend I found him a Windows 7 laptop computer that would do the job for him. I have subscribed to Microsoft Technet for him so I can populate it with the latest versions of software he is familiar with for a minimum cost. The main program he was interested in was MS Office.

Microsoft Office Professional Plus has all the bells and whistles he needs. I installed SlimComputer as well as several other utilities. I deleted Norton Antivirus and installed Microsoft Security essentials. Slim-Computer wanted to install an Ask Tool bar and AVG Antivirus. I was able to deselect those before installation.

Running Older Software
Folks have been complaining about
some software incompatibilities. Now
Microsoft has a solution for them. My
friend has a bunch of older software
designed to run on Windows XP. His
operating system Windows 7 Pro allows the installation of Virtual Computer. The easy option is for it to run

XP just by clicking on Virtual Computer and selecting XP mode. It runs inside windows 7 and uses the hard drives, printers and other peripherals just fine. I installed an XP graphics program. Installing Virtual Computer is a bit tricky, but there are online instructions to guide you through it. Other operating systems such as Linux can be installed this way also. The old solution was to create a dual boot system on your computer, but that has its own set of problems like exchanging files and info. This way is much nicer to work with. It will only work on the pro version.

I needed to transfer stuff to my friends computer without setting it up to run on my network. I used Evernote. It is available on all platforms including Android, iPad, Iphone, Mac and PC's. Notes, attached files or pictures are transferred almost instantly to any platform you are logged in on. A companion program to Evernote is Skitch. It is a really fast way to add arrows, text, boxes etc. to photos. Both are available at Evernote.com as well as several other neat programs.

Face Recognition Software
A while back I needed to find pictures of an individual who had passed away so I could use them for a memorial service. He belonged to an association that I am a member of and I have been taking pictures and collecting pictures from other folks during meetings and conventions for a number of years. Google Plus has teamed up with Picasa 3 for photo editing. I had read that there was a facial recognition feature

in it. It will look at folders and albums you have either on your computer or stored on the web (you can select where to look). It found 11 pictures of the individual on my computer. He was picked out of groups and crowds too. The directions were not straight forward, but I found a YouTube video that detailed the procedure. Picasa is free and has pretty good photo editing


Google Glass Google is working on some very interesting new glasses that are not glasses, but a computer. It is called Google Glass. It can be controlled by eye movements and voice commands. Demonstration units have been shown at computer shows and there are demos on line. It can take movies of what you are looking at. It can do most of what a computer can do. It will probably be a great distraction to drivers if they try to use them while driving. The screen is above and to the right of your right eye.

Xbox 1 New Console Xbox 1 is the new Microsoft game console coming out. You can watch live TV, watch movies, surf the Internet, and play games. Pizza Hut has an app already for it so you can order pizza with it.
